Mission: Rooted in the Franciscan tradition, the Mt. Irenaeus community is committed to simple, joyful, healing communion with God and all creation through contemplation and the communal experience of God's justice, love and peace in contemporary everyday life. Life at Mt. Impact of ministry with SBU students: Hundreds of students, faculty, staff, alumni and friends visit the Mountain each year. More than 900 St. Bonaventure student visits were recorded in 2024-2025. The Mountain is a major player in the retention of students at SBU.

Franciscan vocations: Alongside our ministry with St. Bonaventure University, a significant number of recent men entering into formation to become a friar have come through Mt. Irenaeus. 2025-26 Operating Budget: \$940,000

Endowment Funds: \$6,000,000+ (May 31, 2025)

Other Assets: \$366,000 Building/Physical Plant Fund; \$508,000 in Reserves plus value of property and buildings.

370 acres of land and 10 miles of trails make up Mt. Irenaeus: There are 14 buildings on the Mountain that must be maintained, including the spectacularly beautiful Holy Peace Chapel (1989). The initial land purchase was 204 acres in 1984.

Energy Efficient and Planet-Friendly: The Mountain is primarily self-sustained through the recent installation of solar panels. Our goal is to minimize the use of fossil fuels as much as possible.
