Mary, Joseph and the child to be born, offer us great witness in the place and the trials that we endure as we long for a passage from darkness into light, which is life with God, everlasting peace now and always. From the simplest of settings God rises up as the one who is "Almighty" and yet a serving God who is also all peace and all love.

The celebration of this feast of love started long before religion began or wars laid waste cities, lands and left orphans – long before the earth seemed fertile enough for us to plant and propagate. Long before all of this God was in love with us and would call us forth from his only begotten Son, Christ the Lord. God has been with us through it all!

All this seems like lofty thoughts and ideas until we open our hearts to the faces and photographs of people on these pages. God shines through the stories and the people who are here; the people that visit us at the Mountain and share their life with us there. Since we wrote you last, there are more stories and photographs to share. God's peace and fellowship between peoples has opened here in micro ways – in little places and in little times among us here. We are called to be attentive. With this comes the awe for seeing and hearing this God among us.

Mt. Irenaeus has been a refuge for the tired student and the exalted parent - each finding their way beside each other at our Sunday Mass. Our daily experience tells us, as we open in hope, that "He shall be our peace." As we trust God's word and presence a bit more, part of ourselves is transformed and we become hope for others and work with them for peace in our world.

We seek more and more in a divided world, in a country that is in turmoil, to reach out to "the small as well as the great" among us with loving tenderness.

May we continue to hold each other and all God's creatures, big and small, in the very heart of our loving God who has formed us and still forms for us as the community that bears the marks, the grace, and the spirit of Jesus Christ.
