Franciscan Volunteer Ministry Retreat Reflection: Katie Sullivan, Executive Director

Mt. Irenaeus has been a sacred place for generations of the Franciscan Volunteer Ministry (FVM) community. FVM first came to the Mountain in 1989, and a tradition that has continued for our yearlong, faith formation and volunteer program is to have one of our annual retreats on the Mountain.

This March, we had our Spring Retreat with the Mt. Irenaeus community. Some of the words we have used to describe our time include: rejuvenating, peaceful, encouraging, hopeful, perspective, simplicity, spiritually enlightening, and "retreat — one of the truest forms of a retreat I've been on." We delved deeper into Pope Francis' encyclical Laudato Si' and its invitation for us individually, communally and as a society.

We shared in a contemplative hike one night, drinking in the stillness of the night and the beauty of the stars. We delighted in sledding and in feeding the birds from our hands. We even had a hermit day, a dedicated opportunity for individual reflection and time in creation. We broke bread together, helping in preparation of our meals, celebrating their deliciousness, and helping in cleaning up afterwards. We had joys that bubbled into laughter, and tears resulting from deep sharing. Experiences of mutual listening and sharing brought greater depth to existing relationships and opened up opportunities in new ones.

What is a Franciscan Intentional Community? These communities are:

- Ongoing relational gatherings of people, inspired by Francis & Clare, who choose to cultivate a shared, Spirit-led life through diverse expressions of community.

- Circles that honor the dignity of each living creature through mutual kinship, responding to the needs of the world through both prayer and contemplation, and practicing authenticity, mutual vulnerability and simple living.

This conversation and consideration of an expansion of life came out of our new relationship as part of the Franciscan Federation. We welcomed those who joined us to enter into our intentional community with us, sharing in our prayer practices and helping prepare and clean up after our meals.

We officially established ourselves as the Franciscan Intentional Community Network (FICN), and we affirmed the group who gathered to be part of a coordinating committee moving forward. Part of our upcoming work includes creating a database of Franciscan communities across the country, promoting these communities with our other Franciscan friends, and in virtual communication, and creating a website that would share documents to help other communities in a variety of ways.

While we got plenty of work accomplished, our time together also cultivated important relationships that will steward this work. There is a larger Franciscan community out there than I

realized a few years ago, and the Mountain is becoming more engaged in that world, which will help sustain and grow ourselves into the future!
